ONLINE SURVEY

- 100 participants
- Middle agedArmenian parents

FOCUS GROUP

- 3 different focus groups
 Armenian schools
- each consisting of 10 students

Research Findings

- The household and family which the child grows up in acts as a foundation for the development of their value system.
- Values are passed down from generation to
 generation, especially religious and traditional
 values.
- Discipline is valuable, but aggressive and strict methods are more likely to be ineffective.
 - Warm and supportive methods yield a netter establishment of personal identity within the child.

Conclusion

- The majority of parents adopted an Authoritive parenting style.
- Children with low self-esteem experienced stricter parenting styles throughout their childhood.
- The values of parents are passed down to children more often than not.
